To launch the *Artists & Critics* series, a renowned chef, a prominent food writer and a widely-respected food and restaurant critic will gather for a lively panel discussion to discuss their crafts and the way they see themselves in relation to their fellow panelists and various public constituencies.



Christiane Lauterbach was born and raised in Paris. She is the senior Dining Critic for *Atlanta* magazine and is the publisher of *Knife & Fork, the Insider's Guide to Atlanta Restaurants*. She is the author of the *Atlanta Restaurant Guide* published in paperback by Pelican and has been a member of the James Beard Foundation Restaurant Awards Committee for almost ten years.



Scott Peacock is executive chef at Watershed Restaurant in Decatur and an expert in Southern cuisine. He is co-author of *The Gift of Southern Cooking: Recipes and Revelations from Two Southern Chefs*, with his friend and mentor, the late Edna Lewis, considered America's foremost authority on traditional southern cooking. In May 2007, Chef Peacock received the award for "Best Chef in the Southeast" from the James Beard Foundation.



Jeffrey Steingarten writes a regular column on food for *Vogue* magazine and has also written for *Slate*. His first book, *The Man Who Ate Everything*, won a Julia Child Book Award. His second collection of essays, *It Must've Been Something I Ate*, appeared in 2002. Steingarten hosted the television show, "New York Eats" and serves frequently as a judge on the Food Network show "Iron Chef America."
